Summary: This document dates from the early 1570s since it indicates that Oxford was still possessed of his mansion at London Stone, which he sold in 1573 to Sir Ambrose Nicholas (d.1578) (see TNA PROB 11/60 and TNA 30/34/14), and his manors in Cornwall, which he sold in 1575 to Sir John Arundel (d.1590) of Lanherne (see CRO AR/1/856). Two names in the document also help to date it. William Fleetwood is named in the document as Recorder of London, an appointment he received in 1571, and Thomas Wilbraham is named as Attorney of the Court of Wards, a position he held circa 1571-1573 (see Hurstfield p. 225). The document records the fees paid to the keepers, stewards, and other officers of Oxford's estates and to various legal officials, as well as the annuities which had been granted to various officers and servants by the $16^{\text {th }}$ Earl. Most of these fees and annuities are also recorded in TNA C 142/136 12 and in TNA WARD $8 / 13$. The total given for fees ( $£ 1577 \mathrm{~s} 1 \mathrm{~d}$ ) is out by 66 s 8 d , which suggests that the compiler of the document omitted to add one of the fees for that amount. The total for fees should be $£ 16013 \mathrm{~s} 9 \mathrm{~d}$, and the total for fees and annuities should be $£ 32513 \mathrm{~s}$ 9 d . This latter total represents a considerable percentage of Oxford's income since Oxford's entire landed inheritance amounted to about $£ 2000$ of net rental income a year, an amount Oxford never received in any one year, either during his minority or after he came of age.
